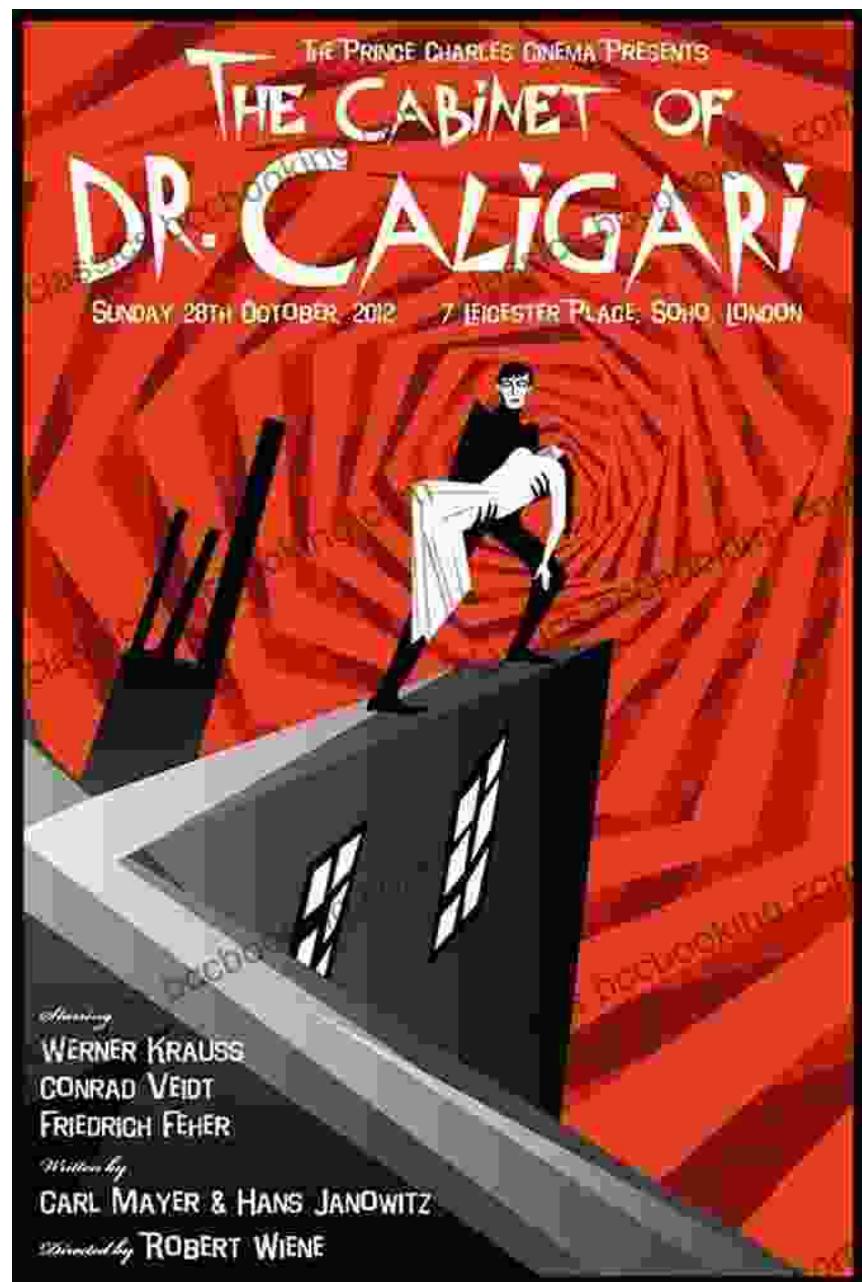

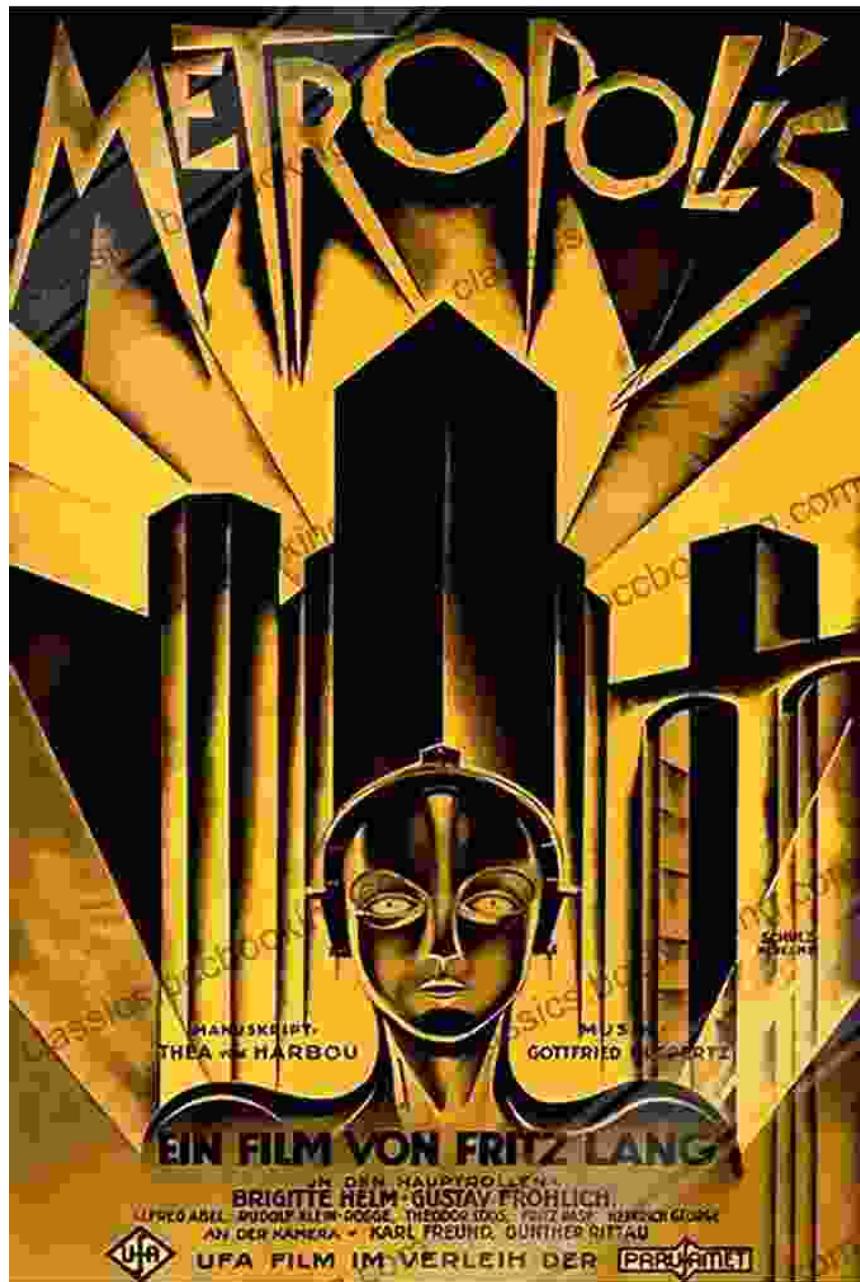
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The Classic Era

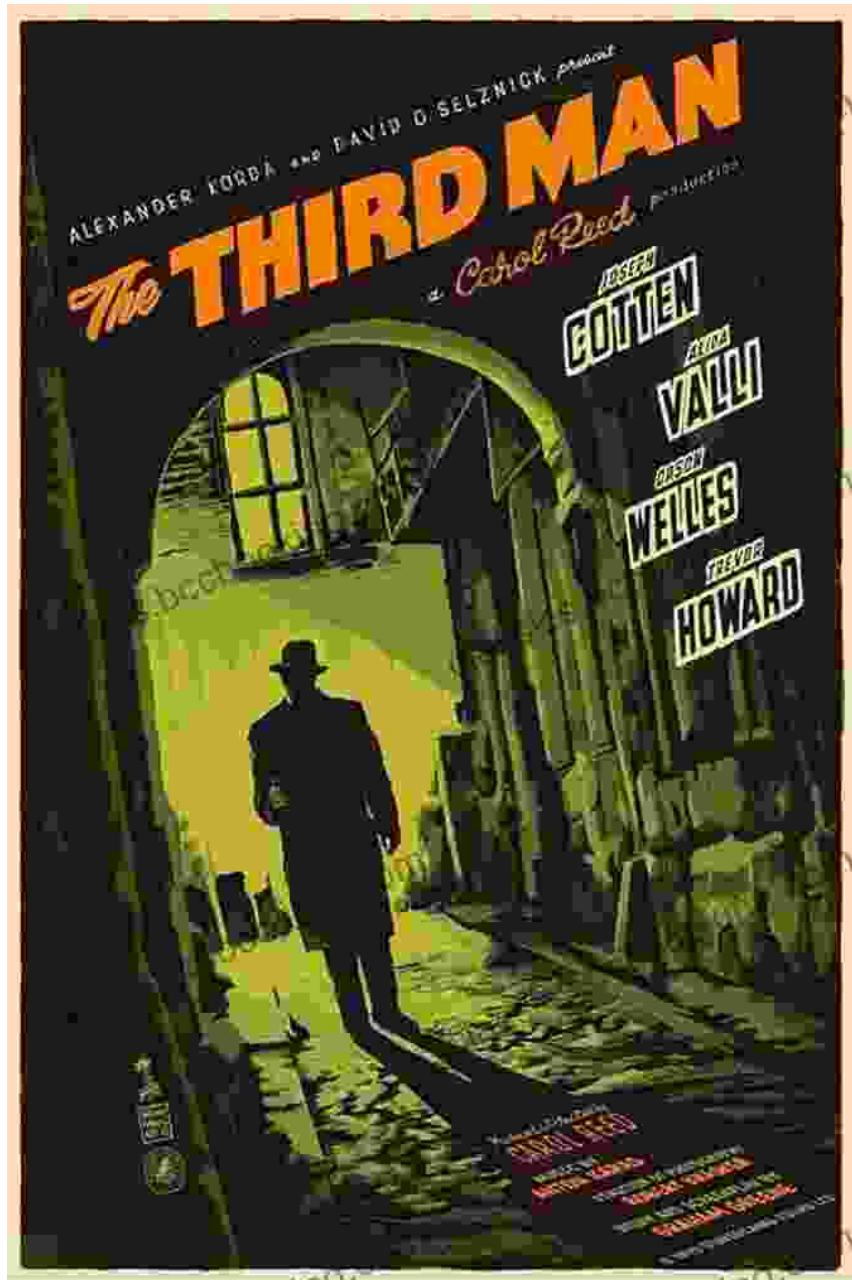

The Modern Era

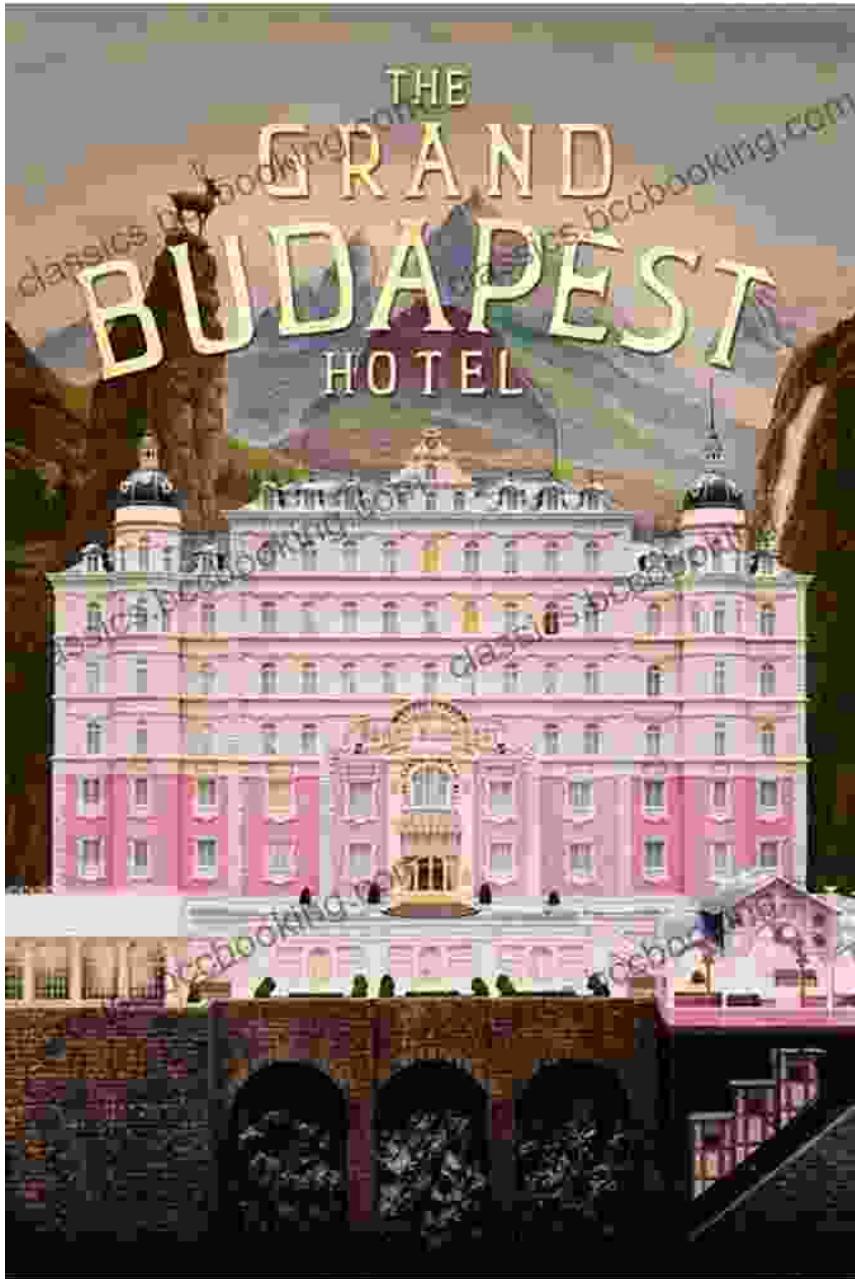
The modern era of American foreign films posters began in the mid-1950s and continues to the present day. During this time, posters have become more standardized and less artistic. However, there are still some great
