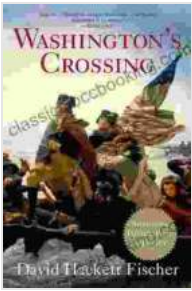


Washington Crossing: A Pivotal Moment in American History

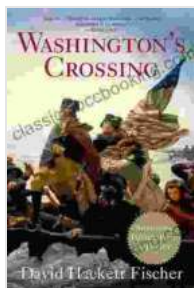
